A LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Beloved siblings,

July 2021 marks two years since I stepped in as Executive Director. When I accepted this role, I knew I was called to build power with people to organize change in our region. What I did not expect was that it would be more than that; the COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated the inequalities in our systems and left many of our families in the dark. In the midst of so much hardship, I am inspired and energized by the love and compassion that has allowed us to survive so much these past 18 months.

SDOP leaders, clergy and staff have been working tirelessly and alongside each other to ensure the next phase of financial, health and spiritual COVID-19 recovery. In addition to our Faith Community Mutual Aid program, SDOP congregations and local partners hosted vaccine clinics and resource fairs at various congregations including: Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, Christ the King Catholic Church, City of Hope International and Our Lady of Guadalupe. Throughout this report, you will read more about our victories and primary issue campaigns this year.

We were blessed to hire a new Community Organizer as well as a Development and Communications Coordinator. In the last two years, SDOP has expanded membership in San Diego's North County through four new member congregations. We are also very proud to share that in the last year, we have more than doubled the number of faith leaders welcomed into our family!

We are excited for 2022. Our statewide network, PICO CA, will see through an 18 month Renewal process where we set forth a prophetic, strategic and powerful vision for our collective organizing efforts. On the organizing front, SDOP will continue to center the dismantling of white supremacy and anti-racism as our core values through our work on various policy initiatives such as: Oceanside police de-escalation, City of San Diego PrOTECT Ordinance and legalization for undocumented essential workers.

Thanks to your support, we have built power through our congregations and celebrated exciting wins. We look forward to continue building with our SDOP family to create a more equitable San Diego for all!



ISSUE CAMPAIGN: A PATHWAY TO CITIZENSHIP

SDOP leaders are engaged in the national fight to legislate protection and a path to citizenship for undocumented essential workers. President Biden and Congress are negotiating what will be included in the jobs and infrastructure package of the President's Build Back Better plan, and we are advocating for the inclusion of a pathway to citizenship for essential workers, TPS holders, Dreamers and farm workers.

JUSTICE SYSTEM REFORM

ISSUE CAMPAIGN: PrOTECT ORDINANCE

Alongside our partners at the Coalition for Police Accountability and Transparency (CPAT), we are working to pass the Preventing Overpolicing Through Equitable Community Treatment (PrOTECT) ordinance through the San Diego City Council. PrOTECT will require San Diego law enforcement to have probable cause to stop, ask for identification, question or search someone, and hold officers accountable if they violate the ordinance. The PrOTECT ordinance seeks to address invasive policing practices that disproportionately harm lowincome communities and communities of color.



2021 VICTORY:

Oceanside Police Department -Thanks to our leaders' organizing efforts, Oceanside Police Chief Armijo agreed to adopt a mandatory de-escalation policy. This will change the language from "should" to "shall" and hold police officers who could use deescalation tactics but don't accountable.
