

HUMAN TRAFFICKING PREVENTION

In 2020, one of our member congregations trusted in us the story of a family living through the devastating experience of human trafficking.

Thanks to SDOP's advocacy, the County of San Diego voted to pass Supervisor Nora Vargas' letter titled, Enhancing Human Trafficking Prevention and Coordination. This letter will direct the Chief Administrative Officer to look at how we can more effectively support survivors with the most available resources possible to give them the best opportunity to not just survive, but thrive.





For the first time, the County of San Diego honored January as Human Trafficking Prevention and Awareness Month, and presented the San Diego Organizing Project with a proclamation for our commitment to supporting and empowering survivors and their families.

OUR SAFETY

In the first half of 2022, SDOP organizers and leaders embarked on a listening campaign where we had over 1,500 conversations with impacted community members in our congregations.

Over and over, we heard similar themes: our families need secure housing, our families need to feel safe, and our families deserve opportunities to live and thrive.

This led us to conceive SDOP's countywide organizing strategy: Our Home, Our Safety.



SDOP's vision for our region's future demands that families and communities can continue to call San Diego home. We were called to double down on housing: create immediate solutions to the ongoing crisis and build power to move long-term, systemic change. Additionally, we must ensure our siblings of color do not fear existing in our neighborhoods, and end pretext stops, racial bias and inhumane policing in our region.



For over two years, the St. Francis' organizing team has been advocating for an inclusionary housing policy and access to affordable housing in Vista. An inclusionary housing policy would require housing developers to dedicate a certain percentage of new residential units to lower-income housing.

The team embarked on months of organizing: attending 2 city council meetings, hosting a worship on the issue, leading 5 research meetings and 1 action with Vista City Council, and surveying over 400 fellow congregants.



In a victory this year, the Planning Commission Public Hearing voted to pass the inclusionary housing policy. This is the first step to mandating Inclusionary housing In the city of Vista.

The final City Council vote is expected to take place in January 2023.







Antonio Sanchez and his wife own a trailer and rent the land at Keystone Trailer Park, National City. This summer, the new property manager at Keystone nearly doubled Antonio's rent, and increased the prices of parking and utility fees. The management also treats the tenants very badly, threatening

Antonio and his wife and entering their home without permission.

For months, Antonio and other Keystone residents have been organizing with SDOP, speaking at City Council meetings about the urgency of the rent increases and poor park conditions. Thanks to SDOP's organizing and advocacy efforts, the National City City has voted to bring the rent control for mobile home tenants ordinance forward.

On December 6th, National City City Council passed rent control for mobile home tenants, preventing over 270 families from experiencing homelessness and protecting tenants from rent increases of over 5% until 2024. This is the first policy of Its kind In National City!

2022 PRIMARY & MIDTERM ELECTIONS:

This election year, we reimagined the strength of a voter engagement program. SDOP designed and led a program that not only gets out the vote, but also transform the future of San Diego by fostering authentic and meaningful relationships. This process of voter engagement coupled with community building increased voter engagement in low-income, young, communities of color beyond a one-time election, leading into long-term systemic change.




